Kamehameha Schools Official Enrollment for SY2001-2002

K-12 ENROLLMENT

The enrollments for K-12 are given by grade level at each campus (see Table 1). On September 1, 2001, the Kapālama campus had an enrollment of 3,192; the E. Hawai'i campus had 340 students; and the Maui campus had an enrollment of 272 students. The official system-wide enrollment for all KS campuses, Kindergarten through Grade 12, is 3,804.

Enrollments at the Kamehameha Schools campuses fluctuate throughout the year as students withdraw and are replaced. In order to provide a stable enrollment number for the year, September 1 was established as the date on which the official K-12 enrollment count would be taken annually.

Enrollment by District

The admissions department strives to balance admissions by geographic district to mirror the distribution of Hawaiian students in the public schools. Currently, this cannot be fully achieved because boarding spaces are limited to 555 beds, about 23 percent of the Kapālama grades 7-12 enrollment. On September 1, 2001, there were 93 boarders in grades 7-8 and 435 boarders in grades 9-12 for a total of 528.

The percentage of Hawaiian students, Grades 9-12, in the DOE for school year 2000-2001 is compared with the district percentages of 2001-2002 Kamehameha Schools High School students in Table 2.

Students admitted at grades 10-12 are selected according to gender and day/boarding status, not district quotas.

In addition to applicants admitted by geographic districts, applicants who are orphaned or from indigent circumstances and those with special non-academic gifts and talents are given special consideration for admission. Set-asides for these special categories are established.

Neighbor Island Enrollment

The neighbor island enrollment K-12 is 1,142 or 30 percent of total enrollment. This includes a total of 612 students in Kindergarten through grade 8 at the East Hawai'i and Maui campuses.

Special Consideration Enrollments

Orphan/Indigent and Gifted/Talented students are not invited according to district quotas, yet together represent 25 percent of new invites at grades 7 and 9, while Orphan/Indigent students represent 15 percent of new invites at kindergarten and grade 4.

Orphan and Indigent Enrollment.

This year, 115 (14.4 percent) of the 796 new students admitted were orphaned and/or indigent.¹

Gifted and Talented Enrollment

The gifted and talented category applies only to applicants in grades 7 and 9 at this time except E. Hawai'i invited for grade 8.

There were 396 students admitted to these grades and 73 (18 percent) met the criteria for gifted and talented admission although all but 34 were accepted in their geographic district.²

Table 3 gives the breakdown of admissions for the 2001-2002 school year. Students were admitted into Kamehameha at all but the second grade level. Some of the admissions—3rd, 5th, 6th, and 8th—were only at E. Hawai'i and Maui as grade levels and classes were added. The table gives numbers of students admitted in regular admissions districts, those admitted as orphaned and or indigent, and those admitted as gifted and talented. If students were not admitted at all three campuses, this is noted beside the grade level.

¹ *Orphans* are those with no more than one living biological parent. *Indigents* are students who receive public assistance.

² *Gifted and Talented* is an admissions category for students who exhibit special gifts and talents in language, performing arts, and athletics.

PRESCHOOL ENROLLMENT

Only the preschool division, under ordinary circumstances, adds sites or classrooms during the school year. For that reason, although the official enrollment is given as the enrollment on September 1, if a classroom is added, preschool enrollment is then stated as the official enrollment plus the enrollment for the new classroom (both numbers should be given).

For the 2001-2002 schoolyear, official preschool enrollment on September 1, 2001 was 1031. The KS Preschools now run on a year-round schedule, and a new year opens in late July or early August rather than near the end of August. Thus, by September 1 the enrollment has stabilized.

The first five classrooms for 3-year-olds opened in 1999-2000. The preschools follow the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) 1997 guidelines for appropriate practices.

Thus, in classrooms for 3-year-olds, there are no more than 16 students and no fewer than two adults per classroom.

In classes for 4-year-olds, the NAEYC guidelines stipulate no more than 20 four-year-olds and at least two adults per classroom.

On September 1, 2001, 1,031 students were being taught in 11 classrooms for 3-year-olds and 45 classrooms for 4-year-olds. One classroom held a combination class of 3- and 4-year-olds. Table 4 shows the breakdown of sites, classrooms, and students by districts.

During the 2001-2002 schoolyear, plans are underway to open several more classrooms for 3- and 4-year-olds.³

Finding appropriate classroom facilities that meet licensing and accreditation requirements is a formidable task. Since July 1999, the focus has been on obtaining sites that will serve both four- and three-year-olds.
