General Information

The Kamehameha Schools Hawai'i Summer School Program, Kula Kauwela offers students a diverse curriculum discovering core academic challenges, Hawaiian culture, the arts and culture-based/place-based/project-based learning applications. The program is open to students entering grades 1-8 and, incoming kindergartners who are 5 years of age by June 14, 2010.

KS Hawai'i Kula Kauwela will give priority to students not currently enrolled at a Kamehameha Schools campus in our efforts to continue to serve a larger Hawaiian population. Summer school opportunities include experiences that enhance and reinforce academic readiness and skill building with culture-based/place-based/project-based learning. Class sizes are limited to ensure optimal teacher-to-student ratios. Summer school teachers are Kamehameha staff or instructors from the Hawai'i island community, neighbor islands, and U.S. mainland with expertise in their content areas.

Registration

Applications will be available to prospective summer school students from January 4 – February 27, 2010.

The application deadline is February 27, 2010 (post-marked).

Applications received after February 27, 2010 will not be accepted.

Please note that if your child is an incoming kindergartener, he/she must be 5 years of age by June 14, 2010.

Enrollment in our summer program is based on a completed application and space/course availability. An incomplete application will delay your child's registration; during which time requested classes may become unavailable before you are able to complete the registration process.

Early registration is recommended since courses and buses fill quickly. If you are registering for Middle School, please be sure to list an alternate course. If both options have been exhausted, a student will be waitlisted.

Policy to Give Preference to Hawaiian Applicants

Kamehameha Schools' policy is to give preference to applicants of Hawaiian ancestry to the extent permitted by law. If you would like to be considered under that policy, your Hawaiian ancestry must be verified by Kamehameha's Ho'oulu Hawaiian Data Center. Please work directly with the Data Center staff to complete your ancestry determination as soon as possible and preferably no later than the application deadline for the program for which you are applying. Financial Aid

KAMEHAMEHA SCHOOLS STUDENTS currently receiving financial aid for the 2009-2010 school year are already eligible for financial aid, and **DO NOT** need to complete a financial aid application for summer school.

ALL OTHER STUDENTS applying for financial aid (includes KS students NOT currently receiving financial aid and siblings of KS students) must complete a summer school financial aid application.

NOTE: Students who are awarded financial aid and later decide not to attend summer school must notify the Summer School Office immediately to allow wait-listed students the opportunity to enroll in the Summer Program. Parents failing to inform the Summer School Office in a timely fashion, prior to or by the start of summer school, will be given lower priority in registering for future summer programs.

- All financial aid applications and required documents are **DUE by February 27, 2010 (postmarked)**.
- **LATE** or **INCOMPLETE** financial aid applications **WILL NOT** be accepted.

Course Withdrawals

Once a space has been reserved and paperwork has been processed, refunds will be made according to the following schedule:

Prior to May 7: Full refund, less \$25.00
From May 10 – 28: Full refund, less \$35.00
After June 1: No refund

Early notification of your child's cancellation is requested so that spaces may be filled from students on the waitlist. Parents failing to inform the Summer School Office in a timely fashion, prior to or by the start of summer school, will be given lower priority in registering for future summer programs. All requests for withdrawals and refunds must be made in writing before a reimbursement will be made.

Tuition and Summer School T-Shirt Fees

Tuition for summer school is for the full-day and includes lunch.

Four Week Session: \$400.00

The cost of a Summer School T-shirt will not exceed \$7.00. Enrolled students must have a current blue Summer School T-shirt and will be allowed to purchase up to five (5) T-shirts. Alterations to Summer School T-shirts will not be allowed.

Packet Pickup

Attendance

The Summer Program has a strict attendance policy. Daily attendance is critical if students are to master course materials. **Absences due to family trips and vacations, games and/or athletic tournaments are discouraged and students who are unable to commit to the full Summer Program should not apply.**

Students applying to Explorations, Ho'olauna, or Kūlia I Ka Pono programs should keep in mind the dates of each program and apply to each program accordingly.

Absences will affect student progress. Excessive absences will lead to disciplinary action which may include a No Pass for the course and/or release from the Summer Program.

Consequences for students with more than three (3) unexcused absences may result in release from the Summer Program.

Student Evaluation

Elementary School: Students in grades K–5 will receive a final progress report summarizing the course activities and reporting on student progress.

Middle School: Students in grades 6–8 will receive a final report card with Pass or No Pass as an evaluation of their work.

Lunch

Lunch is included in the tuition cost and will consist of nutritious meals prepared in Hā'aeamahi Dining Hall. **All students are required to eat school lunch.** Outside food is not allowed. Students with special dietary needs

are requested to bring a note from their **physician stating their dietary restrictions. Requests will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis.**

Transportation

Transportation is provided to and from various locations for a fee (one way or round trip).

Elementary School

Course Recommendations

Elementary School (Grades K-5) — Courses can also be viewed online at <http://hawaii.ksbe.edu/summer>.

Curriculum

Students entering grades K–5 are invited to participate in our all-day Summer School Program. The elementary program is an all-day program beginning at 8:00 a.m. and ending at 2:45 p.m.

Depending upon the grade level, students will focus on two themes; K–Grade 2 will focus on community and students in grades 3-5 will focus on environmental issues. Through theme exploration, students will work in core academic areas (math, science, language arts and social studies). Theme-based programs involve hands-on active participation, cooperative work and plenty of fun.

Students will have the opportunity to experience a wheel of specialty courses focusing on ‘Ike Hawai‘i (all things Hawaiian), technology, creative arts, music (K–1) and physical education. Each course is designed to give students the opportunity to participate in a range of hands-on activities that are age appropriate.

Kamehameha Schools is a Protestant Christian school; therefore, the student will participate in all Christian Education classes, worship services and other religious functions.

‘Ike Hawai‘i

Hawaiian cultural values are at the hub of this special course. Your keiki will learn more about our island home and what makes it unique through multiple modalities—singing, chanting, dancing, art, writing, and reading.

Kamehameha is committed to perpetuate and practice ‘Ike Hawai‘i; therefore, all students will participate in all Hawaiian culture classes and activities.

Technology

Keiki will learn how to use various software programs and how to apply this knowledge to subsequent projects. Some of the programs include KidPix, Microsoft Word, Appleworks and Stationary.

Creative Art

Keiki will learn how to use different media to create works of art. Art concepts such as line, texture and design will be taught. When possible, the grade level’s thematic emphasis will be integrated.

Physical Education

Physical fitness and nutrition are two key concepts taught during summer school. Your keiki will swim, dance, run, and make healthy snacks. Physical Education promises to be fun and educational while promoting a healthy lifestyle for all!

Music

Keiki will learn to sing songs that incorporate their grade level’s thematic emphasis (community or environmental issues). In addition, Hawaiian songs and mele haipule will be taught.

Kindergarten Information

The kindergarten orientation will focus on social development, work habits and reading skills. It is strongly recommended for students entering kindergarten for the first time and is mandatory for kindergarten students entering Kamehameha Schools Hawai‘i in the 2009–2010 school year.

Express Yourself!

Reading/writing workshop is a balanced program integrating the process of reading, writing, speaking, and listening with language learning and literature. Experience reading, writing, and oral communication as interrelated and interactive processes operating in meaning-rich contexts. Develop greater ease and control in the use of these processes to learn and express yourself. You'll also develop study habits and learning strategies to succeed with communication tasks. For all workshop courses, the first two weeks will be literature intensive and the second two-weeks will be writing intensive courses.

Grade 6

Reading and Writing for Meaning! and Jump Start 6th Grade with TOOLS FOR SUCCESS

Course #HSM660

The morning portion of this class covers literature appropriate for the sixth grade level. Students will read both fiction and non-fiction pieces and they will learn to create meaning by identifying literary elements like setting, character, conflict and resolution. For non-fiction pieces, students will learn to identify the who, what, when, where, why and how of non-fiction pieces. Students will also learn to move from writing simple sentences to complex, embedded sentence types in order to improve their writing style and create a unique voice for their writing.

The afternoon components of this class will allow students to master skills that will help to successfully transition into the middle school culture, including keyboarding, study skills, and using library resources. (KS cultural protocols, school and Hawaiian history will also be incorporated.)

Grade 7

Reading and Writing With Clarity! and CULTURE-BASED/PLACE-BASED/PROJECT-BASED APPLICATION

Course #HSM760

The morning portion of the class provides reading-intensive workshop to help students read between the lines by using their background knowledge of literary elements, their personal experiences and symbolic/metaphoric elements of fiction to establish theme and reflect on what they learned from a piece. Students will also experience a writing-intensive workshop allowing them to practice their organization skills in order to write cohesive paragraphs that are clear and understandable in their crafting.

The afternoon components of this class will allow students to apply their newly acquired skills in a culture-based/place-based/project-based environment. They will demonstrate their understanding of the curriculum while applying it through culture or wahi pana (specific place) in a manner that is relevant to them.

Grade 8

The Magnificent Author! and CULTURE-BASED/PLACE-BASED/PROJECT-BASED APPLICATION

Course #HSM860

For the first part of the class, students will practice inferring skills needed to make meaning out of text. This class will prepare students for 8th grade and beyond by improving their ability to compare/contrast elements in literature like theme, style and purpose. This class will also show students how to bridge individual paragraphs together into one cohesive piece through use of thesis, topic sentences and transitions. Students will continue to develop their revision tools by working in small writing groups.

The afternoon components of this class will allow students to apply their newly acquired skills in a culture-based/place-based/project-based environment. They will demonstrate their understanding of the curriculum while applying it through culture or wahi pana (specific place) in a manner that is relevant to them.

Basic Skills in Mathematics

Mathematics at the middle school level requires students to demonstrate they are capable of performing basic computations in a wide variety of situations. The *National Council of Teachers of Mathematics* (NCTM) adheres to the belief that in addition to basic addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division of whole numbers, students in the middle grades “should become proficient” in using fractions, decimals, percents and integers to solve problems. If you are a student who needs some extra help with basic skills in mathematics, one of the **MATH WORKSHOP** courses shown below may be just the thing for you. Check it out!

Grade 6

Math Workshop and Jump Start 6th Grade with TOOLS FOR SUCCESS

Course #HSM657

Students will work on grasping basic whole number combinations as they concentrate on mastery of single-digit addition and multiplication pairs. Emphasis will be placed on using the quick recall of basic facts to perform straightforward computations involving addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division of whole numbers.

The afternoon components of this class will allow students to master skills that will help to successfully transition into the middle school culture, including keyboarding, study skills, and using library resources. (KS cultural protocols, school and Hawaiian history will also be incorporated.)

Grade 7

Math Workshop and CULTURE-BASED/PLACE-BASED/ PROJECT-BASED APPLICATION

Course #HSM761

In addition to using the quick recall of basic facts to perform straightforward computations involving addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division of whole numbers, students will also work on improving their abilities to manipulate fractions and mixed numbers.

The afternoon components of this class will allow students to apply their newly acquired skills in a culture-based/place-based/project-based environment. They will be demonstrating their understanding of the curriculum while applying it through the culture or wahi pana (specific place) in a manner that is relevant to them.

Grade 8

Math Workshop and CULTURE-BASED/PLACE-BASED/ PROJECT-BASED APPLICATION

Course #HSM862

In addition to using the quick recall of basic facts to perform straightforward computations involving addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division of whole numbers, fractions, and mixed numbers, students will also work on improving their abilities to compute fluently with decimals, proportions, and percents.

The afternoon components of this class will allow students to apply their newly acquired skills in a culture-based/place-based/project-based environment. They will demonstrate their understanding of the curriculum while applying it through the culture or wahi pana (specific place) in a manner that is relevant to them.
