Questions #1-6 from An Inventory of Exemplary Hawaiian Leadership Behaviors (G.Kaulukukui & D.Naho‘opi‘i, 2007) and Questions #7-12 from the Native Hawaiian Charter School Graduate Survey (A.Borofsky, 2008):

1. I am guided to lead by the presence of a higher power.
2. I am taught to lead by my ancestors.
3. I listen to my na‘au.
4. I obtain the input of kupuna before making a decision
5. I am ha‘aha‘a or humble when praised by others for doing excellent work.
6. I am not afraid to take a stand.
7. I lead in hula and chant.
8. I serve as a role-model to the younger generation.
9. I use my cultural foundation to serve my ‘ohana.
10. I use my cultural foundation to serve my community.
11. I use my cultural foundation to serve the global/universal honua.
12. I use the past to lead the future.

(5-point Likert Scale: Strongly Disagree, Disagree, Neither Disagree or Agree, Agree, Strongly Agree)

Internal Reliability:

Cronbach’s Alpha of .92 for a sample of 47 Native Hawaiian Charter School Graduates. The measure was then revised to include qualitative responses from graduates for this final version.
