Russ Entry **Forecast**

Litvinoff Says Soviet Fighting "A Common Foe"

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13—Early entry of the war with Japan by Russia was forecast here today following a public statement by Maxim Litvinoff, Soviet ambassador, who declared that "Japan is a common

ambassador, who declared that "Japan is a common enemy belonging to the same bunch of gangsters".

While Moscow had no comment to make on intentions toward Japan, Litvinoff's statement here was taken to be the official expression of Josef Stalin and it was freely forecast that Russia would soon take the initiative against Japan, either with or without a formal declaration of war.

"We are all in the same boat," Livinoff said. "The Soviet Union is both proud and happy to be the ally of the great nation of the United States. We will be victorious.

"The destruction of Hitler will end the ills of the world. We have no intention of allowing Hitler to hibernate this winter. We will smash at him till he is destroyed. Japan is our common enemy!"

Washington was officially notified today that Venezuela had opened her ports to World Ally vessels axis funds, including those of nations in Venzuela, have been frozen.

In Washington and clear across the broad expanse of the United States tonight rang the battle cry of 1941, "Remember Pearl Harbor" and judging from recruiting office reports the nation would carry this slogan into a battle against Japan that will forever still that nation's warlike designs.

RECRUTING RECORDS HEAVY

Recruits in navy, army and marine corps swamped offices in all sections of the country and the demand for air corps training was far in excess of the facilities now available.

A flotilla of three Italian cruisers in the Mediterranean, presumably part of a large supply convoy, was destroyed by two small British and one Dutch destroyers. A Dutch submarine also engaged in the fight which further reduced Italy's small remants of a once powerful navy. The flotilla was commanded by British Naval Commander G. H. Stokes.

The Dutch submarine, 1800 tons, was not completed when the nazis took over Holland but was taken to England where it was commissioned and is now operating in conjunction with the British Mediterranean forces.

NEW YORK-Fourteen nazi

NEW YORK—Fourteen nazi spies, on trial in this city on espionage charges, were convicted on all counts here today and now face sentences totalling 22 years each in a federal prison. The trial lasted approximately 15 weeks during which strong evidence of enemy agents' activities in this country was produced by the FBI.

From Manila came an official report from Lieut. General Douglas McArthur, commanding the defending forces, of the heroism of Captain Collins E. Kelley of this city who, single-handed, dive-hombed the 29,330 ton Japanese battleship Haruna and sunk her with three well directed torpedoes.

Captain Kelley went down with his ship following the bombing and was lost.

Another hero of the Battle of Manila cited in communiques today is Lieut. Boyd D. Wagner of Philadelphia who shotdown seven Japanese fighters and hombers and returned to his base at Cavite safely.

General McArthur reported that parachutists and landing parties had secured a foothold in one vital spot on Luzon but that resistance was remaining stubborn. Fifth columnists using flares attempted to aid the landing parties and parachutists and are being tracked down and shot, it was reported.

The official announcement by Pravas struck Tokyo just as the city was prepared to sit down to a bringuet to delebrate the "victory" at Pearl Harbor, casting a heavy pall of gloom over the Japanese capital.

Alien-Owned Shortwave Sets Must Be Turned In To Police

All aliens of Japanese, Italian and German ancestry must turn their short wave radio receiving sets unless they have citizens in the family that are over 12 years of age, in which case they may keep them, Chief of Police George Larsen Jr., acting provost marshal, announced today

These must be turned in to the nearest police station, he said.

Since Japan's unprovoked attack Sunday morning the Tokyo radio has broadcast in both Japanese and English news reports which grossly exaggerated the results of the bombings of Pearl Harrbor.

First Lt. Lewis M. Sanders, 809 Pasadena drive, Fort Wayne, Ind., of another pursuit squadron, flying at approximately 3,000 feet, saw a dogfight between an American and a Japanese plane.

saw the American plane go down in flames. In an avenging fury Lt. Sanders relentlessly pursued the Japanese plane and shot him

Lt. Gordon H. Sterling, Jr., 56 Argyle Ave., West Hartford, Conn., of the same squadron, upon attaining sufficient altitude, located a formation of six enemy ships.

Undaunted by superior numbers he coura-geously attacked, cutting out one Japanese

plane, and destroying it.
Second Lt. Philip M. Rasmussen, 75 Westchester Road, Jamaica Plains, Boston, of the same squadron and flying the same type pur-suit ship, engaged a single Japanese fighter. There ensued a dogfight over Schofield Bar-

racks and anxious watching thousands thrilled as Lt. Rasmussen's superior maneuvering enabled him to bring the Japanese plane down to the ground in a burning broken mass of wreck-

Second Lt. Harry W. Brown, 1007 Monroe St., Amarillo, Tex., a member of Lt. Taylor's and Lt. Welch's squadron, searching for the attacking Japanese, unexpectedly found himself in the midst of a rendezvous of Japanese planes.

Instead of a discreet departure he engaged one, out-maneuvered it and shot the plane down in the ocean off Kahuku point.



World Allies Plan "No Separate Peace" **Announcement Soon**

ASHINGTON, Dec. 14-The navy Panama patrol, throwing an every-tightening screen around the vital defenses of the Ca-nal Zone, Saturday intercepted the Alert, a large, fast fishing boat somewhere off the coast of Costa Rica and forced it to return to an unnamed port where three alien Japanese and two American citizens were taken into custody. Investigation revealed that he boat carried

10,000 gallons of diesel oil as cargo. Further details of her destination were not announced but the five men were taken into custody.

Costa Rica borders on Panama and is regarded as vital territory insofar as the protection of the canal is concerned.

Simultaneous with the announcement that a Simultaneous with the announcement that a supreme war council composed of military and naval leaders from the United States, Britain and Russia would soon be named, official circles revealed that discussions are now proceeding among representatives of the three governments which will shortly lead to a firm pronouncement that these nations will not consent to a separate peace with any of the axis partners and would definitely pledge themselves to a "fight to the finish."

PHILIPPINES RAISE \$100,000,000

The Philippines assembly and President Manuel' Quezon took rapid steps to prepare the Commonwealth for its most critical period Saturday when a \$100,000,000 war budget was approved and the money made available for defense.

In order to assure greater efficiency in Manila's blackout, the assembly also reenacted daylight saving which will presumably aid authorities in enforcing the blackout provisions.

Saturday night Japanese bombers returned to the attack over the Philippines, attempting to bomb Manila but the defenders drove them off with losses. Fifth columnists aiding the attackers by flashing lights and shooting flares were apers by flashing lights and shooting flares were apprehended. They will be dealt with summarily by a military tribunal.



Knox Returns To D.C.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14---Plans for the strengthening of American Pacific defenses were being
rushed here today, one week after Japan's unprovoked attack on United States territory, as
President Roosevelt prepared to receive Secretary
Knox' personal report on the damage done by enemy
bombers at Pearl Harbor, Hickam Field and other defense areas in Hawaii.

Secretary Knox departed unannounced from Hawaii Friday and was actually over the Pacific enroute to the Pacific Coast when Mainland radio stations announced that he would speak to the nation from Hawaii late Friday night. He was in Midlands, Texas, en route to the capital Saturday night and was expected to meet with the war President Sunday.

LEAHY MAY BECOME COORDINATOR

LEAHY MAY BECOME COORDINATOR

After lengthy conferences with Secretary Hull, and other high officials in the war cabinet, President Roosevelt refused to comment on war plans but usually reliable sources hinted that Admiral William Leahy, now ambassador to the puppet government at Vichy, France, might be appointed military-naval coordinator in the Mid-Pacific to insure greater cooperation between the armed forces in this area.

There was no confirmation of this possible move by the high command but it was indicated that strong measures would be taken to tighten up defenses over Hawaian waters, on land, in the sea and in the air.

A supreme war council to be composed of representatives of the United States, Britain and Russia as well as spokesmen from other members of the World Allies, will be organized soon, according to authentic reports from Washington and London.

The declaration of war on the United States by Bulgaria brought only this comment from a White House spokesman:

Kissinger, Kansas City attorney, was arrested and charged with making statements intended to bring disrepute on the President and congress. Kissinger allegedly has been a "long time sympathizer of the German and Japanese governments."

Nazis Setting Stage For New Blitz

Africa, Azores Dakar May Become New Objectives

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13—The United States is studying increasing signs that Hitler may be about to unleash a blitz thrust in the Mediterranean or West Africa designed to lengthen the German hold on the Atlantic coasts facing the Americas, it was learned tonight.

PRESSURE MODEL

PRESSURE INCREASED

In the past 48 hours, reports of increased Nazi pressure on the Viehy, Turkey, Spain and possibly Portugal have caused speculation in unofficial quarters that Axis moves might develop along any one of the following three lines:

1. An attempted large scale reinforcement of the hard-pressed Italian and German armies in Libya, with men and supplies of sent through the French base at Bizerta, perhaps with a French Tunaval escort.

2. Movement of German troops across the Pyrenees through
Spain simultaneously with Portugal's possible forced surrender
of air and naval bases in the Azores and Cape Verde Islands and
French surrender of Dakar to Hitler.

3. Heavier Nazi pressure upon Turkey to permit movement
of Axis troops through Turkey to flank Russian Caucasia from
the south and a blow at Suez to relieve Italian and German forces in Libya.

A total of 24,500 food ration eards for Mani County residents were distributed by 11 a.m. Sunday it was announced by F. W. Divisional chairmen and stores which have been authorized to issue them to the public Monday morning when the stores open received the eards.

The Island of Mani has been issued 18,000 food ration cards, while Molokai received 4,000 and Lanai, 2,500.

The food administration cards will be effective for four weeks, commencing with Monday, December 15. New cards will be issued when needed by consumers.

Eight thousand gasoline ration cards have been distributed to the district administrators and selected service stations for issue to motorists Monday morning, Jack Lightner, chairfan of the petroleum division revealed.

All motorists will start with regular ration cards which will entitle them to purchase 19 gallons of gasoline for the balance of the month of December. Persons who use up their 10 gallons of gasoline and who require more gasoline to carry on their work may appeal to their district administrator for the issue of a special card which will entitle them to purchase more gasoline after their original card has been used up, if they can prove necessity.



Niihau Is 'Taken' **But Hawaiian Man** 'Takes' The Taker

Japanese Pilot Makes Forced Landing After Air Fight, Is Killed

LIHUE, Kauai, Dec. 16 (UP)-The story of the Japanese capture of the island of Niihau and its subsequent recapture can now be revealed for the first time.

On December 7 a Japanese plane with its pilot was forced down on that radioless and telephoneless island, whose occupants were unaware of the war.

The inhabitants took the pilot's machine gun and side arms and lodged him in the Robinson home as a guest. However, the pilot made friends with two Japanese, Shintani and Harada, who retrieved the arms for him.

Friday a party of cowboys headed by a Hawaiian named Hauila rowed for ten hours to Kauai seeking aid. Meanwhile the pilot, aided by Harada and Shintani, placed the machinegun in the center of the village holding the village at bay.

The pilot enlisted the aid of Benjamin Kana-heli in seeking Hauila, whom the pilot thought had important papers, and during the search Kanaheli rushed the pilot, receiving three bul-let wounds, but knocked the pilot out.

Kanaheli then rushed Harada, who commit ted suicide with a shotgun, while Kanaheli's wife brained the pilot with rocks.

A rescue party arrived on Niihau Saturday and took Shintani and Harada's wife to Kauai.

Maui was given her baptism of fire at 5:42 Mau was given her baptism of fire at 2:42 p.m. Monday night when an enemy warcraft, identified by several witnesses as a submarine fired 10 rounds of high explosive shells at the seaport of Kahului. Property damage was believed to be slight and no one was injured.

The attack was seen and heard from all parts

of Central Maui and from the 4,000 foot level of Kula.

Four shells landed on the property of Maui Pineapple Company where the damage was re-ported by Eugene Sheffield plant superintend-ent, to have been extensive but of a minor na-

A projectile exploded on the driveway of the Maui Vocational school without damage while still another landed in a waste lumber pile along the Paia side of Pier I and dug iinto the con-crete shed's side.

Another projectile landed on the beach in front of the beach home of William Walsh and several were seen to splash in the harbor and on the breakwater. One exploded in front of the Pacific Guano and Fertilizer plant.

At Maui Pine one shell completely tore

through an 18-inch smokestack which was held perpendicularly in place by two remaining guy-wires; another crashed through the roof, leav-ing a gaping hole and embedding large frag-ments of the shell in the concrete floor; two landed on the front lawn.





WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 (UP)-Secretary Navy Frank Knox revealed today that six

Despite the surprise element of the original attack, the army's announcement indicated outstanding success against the raiders and said the search for other planes believed to have been shot down is still in progress and the possibility exists that even more bombers bearing the ris-ing sun emblem will be added to the toll of Japanese planes.

For example, one hostile plane trailing a plume of smoke was seen plunging seaward off the island of Kauai.

Meanwhile the army garrison disclosed it could meet any threat to Hawaii. The army said its forces are "holding all islands" and

that there have not been any landings.

Army authorities said civilian morale in Honolulu is "tremendous," while Territorial officials concurred, adding that "there has not been any panic and sabotage has been at a min-

However, the military government clamped down on aliens, requiring a permit for the following activities:

Firstly, to change their place of abode or occupation; secondly, to visit friends or relatives; thirdly, to travel to and from places of business of occupation.

It was announced that Honoluluans will start 'digging in' under the army order that every male citizen in the Territory is required to construct a bomb shelter for the protection of himself and his family, using his own tools and ma-

Subject; Martial Law Regulations Mani District,

To: Military Governor, Territory of Hawaii, Fort Shafter, T. H.

1. The attached is a summary of regulations for the Mani Dis-trict, released from time to time in semi-news form as official, which were issued for the control and guidance of civilians during this period in the absence of the receipt of General Orders pertaining to Martial Law from your headquarters.

2. These regulations were drawn up with the assistance of the County Attorney and his staff.

3. Request that they be approved for publication and general distribution.

All calls to be as brief as possible. Any person violating this rule will be subject to summary action, and possible removal of his tele-

phone.

(C) a. All radio transmitters, except those operated by authorized Army, Navy, and Police, and such persons acting under direct orders of official agencies, are ordered to remain silent, and all portable transmission apparatus is ordered delivered to the Provost Marshall immediately.

b. All alters of Japanese, Italian, or German ancestry must turn in their short-wave radio receiving sets to the negrest police station immediately. An alien having in his family and living with him any citizen over 12 years of age may retain his set.

(D) All owners or Keepers of carrier pigeons are to report to Provost Marshall or nearest Police headquarters the location and number of pigeons in their possession, and their use for carrying of any and all messages is forbidden.

(E) Mall messages is forbidden.

III ARMS AND AMMUNITION:

Unless otherwise permitted, prices of foods shall not exceed the up Ratio prices at which they were sold or offered for sale on December 6, for Spec 1941.

(A) RETAIL SALES:



Residents Remain Calm Honolulu Is As Gun Hurls Explosives Cheered By Into Harbor And Town

WATER TANK HIT

A large number of windows in the plant were splintered by flying fragments and a water tank on the second floor was hit by a heavy piece of shrapnel and was leaking badly. Water pipes were sprung and one of the boilers under the damaged stack was out of commission.

In the front yard one projectile landed on the Kahului Railroad tracks, sheared off one foot of solid iron and hurled it more than 200 yards into the property of American Can company.

In the entry way of the plant a large sized "Bonds for Bombers" poster attracted a heavy piece of shrapnel with telling results to the poster but this only served to stimulate Maui Pine's spirit in the Defense Bond drive.

Several workmen at the plant took cover and escaped injury.

witnesses who included Mr. Sheffield, F. F. Baldwin, Capt. William Sorenson and C. S. Childs, declared that the craft appeared to be long and low in the water, having superstructure amidships and one mast. This description would indicate a submarine. H. M. Anderson verified these reports from a Makawao observation

After firing 10 rounds the sub disappeared to the Southeast in the growing dusk.

The attack took place just a few minutes before Colonel Charles B. Lyman, commanding Maui District, was to have gone on the air with his first personally delivered message to the people of Maui County, and while he was enroute to the Paia police radio station.

He immediately put into full operation Maui's defense units and the Island's entire forces were kept on a full alert throughout the night as a precaution against further attacks or attempts to land.

The population accepted the sudden attack calmly and without fear or confusion. Telephone communications were not interrupted by curious residents calling for information, the streets, even in Kahului, were virtually deserted and the blackout remained thoroughly in ef-

Colonel Lyman paid high tribute to the people on their behavior in their first experience of the war and also to the forces, civilian as well

as military, that responded quickly and efficiently to his orders.

He emphasized that the suddeness of the attack demonstrated the need for a continuance of the most rigid observation of the blackout. CLOCK TELLS TIME

While eye witnesses disagreed as to the exact time of the firing of the first shot, coincidence attempts to fix the time of the projectile's arrival in the Maui Pine plant at exactly 5:51. A power line leading to the company's electric clock was severed and this morning the hour hand showed the clock to have stopped at 5:51 p.m. Monday.
