1. 1982 Green Machine Scholarship

1 award

- ✓ Minimum GPA 3.0
- ✓ Junior or senior standing
- ✓ Demonstrate leadership/school service
- ✓ Demonstrate community service
- ✓ Preference to a non-traditional student (single parent, sole provider, homeless, disabled, ward of the court)
- ❖ Submit an essay response to the following question: "The lessons we take from obstacles we encounter can be fundamental to later success. Recount a time when you faced a challenge, setback, or failure. How did it affect you, and what did you learn from the experience?"

2. 'Alihi Scholarship

(NEW)

This endowed scholarship was created by Sean K. and Mellissa A.K. Spencer to support haumāna who are residents of Ko'olau Poko, O'ahu pursuing post-high education. The scholarship name was gifted by 'Ohana: 'Alihi is defined as 1) cords or fine ropes threaded through marginal meshes of upper and lower edges of nets, to which were attached floats and sinkers; loops at the top of a kōkō net holding a calabash; 2) Horizon. The 'alihi of a throw net or a gill net, is the edge of the net where the lead or floaters are connected. The last mesh is the strongest part of the net as it holds what is needed to either help float the net or sink the net. The kōkō net, the net that holds a calabash, the loops at the top which are the strongest would be the 'alihi. With 'alihi meaning horizon, most students see their dreams as being out of reach. What the donors are trying to accomplish via this scholarship is similar to a net, the strongest mesh cords are at the top keeping the floaters above water, we are helping to elevate and uplift students, keeping them afloat, while they work to capture their dreams that are within reach.

7. Benedict Kalamakū Lee Loy, KS 1905 Endowed Scholarship

1 award

Sean K. L. and Mary Kawena Browne seek to establish this endowed scholarship fund in memory of Sean's grandfather Benedict Kalamakū Lee Loy of Kamehameha Schools Kapālama Class of 1905. Benedict Kalamakū Lee Loy was born in 1884, in Hilo, Hawai'i. He married Mary Kapuoko Kealoha in 1910. They were the parents of 9 sons and 3 daughters. He died in 1967 in Hawaii at the age of 83. He often reminded his children of what Kamehameha Schools had done for him and what the schools meant to the Hawaiian people. As a result, four of his sons attended and graduated from Kamehameha Schools, Mathew '37, Genesis '39, Elijah '48 and Hartwell '50.

This award will support post-high student(s) who are pursuing a major in Art or Music, attended a public high school with preference to Hawai‘i island residents and demonstrates financial need.

- ✓ Applicants must be pursuing a major in art or music
- ✓ Demonstrate commitment to field of art or music by submitting portfolio or video of a musical performance
- ✓ Preference to applicants who are resident of Hawai‘i island
- ✓ Recipients may be enrolled part-time as a classified student in a post-high school institution (full-time is generally defined as: 12 credit hours per term for undergraduates or 9 credit hours per term for graduate and professional students; or the minimum number of credit hours specified by the degree program)
- ❖ Student Aid Report (SAR) from the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)
- ❖ Submit a hard copy of your art portfolio via mail or email the URL of your online art portfolio to Pauahi Foundation. - ✓ Recipient may be enrolled half-time or full-time as a classified student in a post-high institution (full-time is generally defined as: 12 credit hours per term for undergraduates or 9 credit hours per term for graduate and professional students; or the minimum number of credit hours specified by the degree program.)

Kahu David Kauweloā Kaupu seeks to establish this fund in loving memory of his wife, E. Darlene Kaupu, who passed on June 11, 2020 (Kamehameha Day). Darlene was born on December 19, 1937 in Gilman, Colorado. While attending Yankton College in South Dakota, Darlene met a young Hawaiian theology student, David Kaupu. They were married at the college chapel in 1958 and made their way home to Hawai'i in 1960. For over 61 years, their love was based on two commitments: love for ke Akua and love for others – including each other and their growing 'ohana. Mama Kahu, as she was lovingly known, was a dedicated wife and mother raising her five children, being a dedicated grandmother to her mo'opuna, and parenting many others at Kamehameha Schools and the churches of Hawai'i. This endowed scholarship shall provide opportunities for students to continue their academic studies beyond high school, and a way for the Kaupu 'ohana to honor their kupuna and continue their lifelong legacy with Kamehameha Schools.

28. The Emma Kailikapuolono Metcalf Beckley Nakuina Aloha 'Āina Patriot Scholarship (NEW)

This scholarship is established to honor Emma Kailikapuolono Metcalf Beckley Nakuina (1847 – 1929) and her numerous contributions to Ka Pae 'Āina Hawai'i, from the sovereign Hawaiian Kingdom to the illegally occupied Territory of Hawai'i. The daughter of Chiefess Kailikapuolono of Kūkaniloko, O'ahu and Theophilus Sabin Metcalf of Geneva, New York (a land surveyor for the Hawaiian Kingdom), Emma was considered an intellectual of her time. With a deep love for the 'āina and its people, she was steadfast in her support of kānaka while the nation faced great changes. Emma served as a Hawaiian Historian; as the first Curator of the Hawaiian National Museum; as an Educator and Cultural Practitioner; and starting in 1892 served as Commissioner of Private Ways and Water Rights. Due to her vast knowledge of Hawaiian Kingdom water laws (kānāwai) and her rulings on matters pertaining to freshwater access, Emma Nakuina is largely considered to be the first female Judge in the Hawaiian Islands.
