Description: Papa ho'okele wa'a is an introductory Hawaiian voyaging class designed to prepare haumana with foundational knowledge focused on Hawaiian voyaging culture. Haumana will be educated in mo'okū'auhau through past and present voyaging history, as well as introduced to specific seamanship skills, engage in kilo, and begin study of star navigation. Students will also explore the mindset of "He wa'a he moku, he moku he wa'a," the relationship between canoe and environment, why it is important, and what it looks like.

The course is organized with daily synchronous meetings Monday through Friday with online discussions and projects meant to supplement the lectures, the readings, and to expand thinking. Classes will be delivered online utilizing Zoom and Google classroom to provide a hybrid experience that is synchronous and asynchronous.
