

- Reorganizing: Upper Division, grades 6-12, and Lower Division, grades K-5, have replaced what we formerly called elementary, middle, and high school.
- Staffing changes: Assistant Vice Principals, Upper Division: Kaleo Pahukula, Jaylyn Hashimoto, Kapulani Antonio, and Kyle Fujii-Miller; Lower Division: Lisa Correa and Cyndi Fernandez.
- Deans (formerly called Counselors) at each grade level that will follow the class. Grades 6-8, and Grades 9-13 (Grade level Dean follows grade 12 for an additional year after graduation).
- Hō'ike Nui, Senior Project. Revamping to allow students to create their unique capstone project that best allows them to develop, work, and share their passion.
- Focus on SEL social, emotional learning for all students. Collaboration with Kumu and Deans to provide opportunities for 'ike, growth, and experience.

Former Art Kumu Levi Mason reminded us why she enjoyed her time at KSM and shared her excitement about her current school. She looks the same, radiates the same energy, and currently resides in Texas (after stints in Washington D.C, Georgia, and California). Hulali DeLima '08 Kumu Moʻomeheu

Hulō! to Hulali DeLima, '08, who assumed the position of Kumu Moʻomeheu for Ka Papa 3-5, for the '20-'21 SY! Her kūleana embraces teaching 145 haumāna about the culture, knowledge, and people of traditional Hawaiʻi. Engaging the haumāna in enriching curriculum about our kūpuna Hawaiʻi: daily traditional lifestyle, Hawaiian language, chanting protocols and practices, the land and sea, traditional 'ike, traditional Hawaiian spiritual systems, Hawaiian community, traditional Hawaiian jobs and responsibilities, as well as our beginnings as a Hawaiian people. Haumāna begin every day with pule, 'oli and 'ike, under the direction of kumu Hulali at their morning piko. Hulali is not new to the Maui campus, she began her full-time career as kumu for Papa 'Elima in July of 2016 and served haumāna in that position for 4 years.

We asked kumu Hulali a few questions, enjoy her mana o. Please share a highlight from your new role as kumu for nā haumāna. "I think that my favorite part of this new role is being able to work with so many students. We have the best conversations, and I find myself smiling all day."

What was a fond memory from your days as a KSM student?

"One thing that I enjoyed most about my time at Kamehameha were the relationships I was able to build through extra-curricular activities. It gave me the opportunity to make life-long friends. I especially remember the support of our student body. While playing volleyball the gym was always full of students cheering. We always made it a point to attend sports events as students, because of the amount of pride we held for our kula.

Advice for current students from your journey after KSM? "I would say to let your light shine! Be you and be happy!"

Jalisa Chong Kee Camara '09 - Associate Veterinarian.

"I attended Hawai'i Pacific University and earned my Bachelor of Science in Biology in 2013, and then went straight to veterinary school at Oregon State University College of Veterinary Medicine where I received my Doctorate of Veterinary Medicine in 2017. It was always my goal to return to Maui to practice veterinary medicine. Maui is home, and I wanted to be able to help not only the animals of Maui but also their 'ohana as a whole; as my kūleana to give back to the Maui community. I was so fortunate to be hired as an associate veterinarian at Maui Lani Veterinary Hospital upon graduation from OSU. At Maui Lani Veterinary hospital, we put the well-being of our patients before anything else. We offer a wide range of services with state-of-the-art equipment. I am also a certified veterinary acupuncturist. In this way, I'm able to combine modern (Western) medicine with alternative treatments as well. Being able to connect with my community, help many sick animals, and even meet some KSM alumni in the process, has been so rewarding. I absolutely love my career! They always said, "when you do what you love you will never work a day of your life", and it truly feels that way.

I am so grateful for my education and the opportunities provided to me through Kamehameha Schools. From an exceptional education, to amazing teachers who pushed us to achieve our best, to post-high scholarships/financial aid, KSM played a critical role in my accomplishment of becoming a veterinarian. My advice to students? Although it may sound cheesy, honestly, don't be afraid to pursue your dreams. I knew as a child that I wanted to be a veterinarian, but I had reservations about attending graduate school on the mainland so far from family and home. Because of these reservations, I almost didn't apply to veterinary school. Looking back now, I'm so glad I did."

After graduating, Nicki ventured to the east coast and attended Dartmouth College where she met her wonderful husband Alex. She pursued her degree in education and art and has taught social studies and art at all levels. 

Aunty Melani Abihai, KSK '67

"I retired from KSM in the spring of 2007, after serving at the school for 10 years. It was a fulfilling time of much growth as we set up in each of our new campuses. I moved offices 5 times in those years until I finally had a permanent home in the high school. Starting the schools was an exciting time full of challenges and constant change. When I left my first grandchild was 3 months old. I left to start a new phase of my life with the Federal Aviation Administration. I am still happily employed there. I don't foresee "retiring" again any time soon. I love the people and the Maui Air Traffic Control Tower is never boring. In 2012 my husband and I moved into our retirement home he built for us in Waiohuli. As I continue to work, my husband Norman is living his dream of farming our one acre. He has maximized our 'aina so that it sustains us. It's wonderful to not have to worry about buying poi, as we make our own from our grown kalo. I make seasonal jams and jellies from the abundance of fruits we have growing (quava, fig, papaya, mango, poha, lilikoi, dragon fruit, banana, citrus, etc). There is never a lack! I now have 8 mo'opuna, 2 of which are students at KSM in grades 6 & 8. I tell them they better behave and be respectful, cause I have eyes on them! I still try to attend school athletic events. My 8th grader is already preparing for baseball with the high school team and played this past year with the head coach that is a part of the first graduating class of 2006. So I'll be back watching more KSM baseball games for the next 4+ years. I still miss the students and am gratified when I see them now as adults in the community. I may not remember names but I do remember faces. Many parents come up to me still to say hi and I have to ask, "what's your name again?" Happens all the time........ so please don't hesitate to say hi when you see me. A little bit makule, but am healthy, happy and living a blessed life. A hui hou!" Aunty Melani

Summer Courses for Native Hawaiian Students



NHSS Summer Institute (for college students!) TUITION-FREE SUMMER COURSES AVAILABLE | **Register Here**

The Summer Institute provides for-credit sheltered classes for incoming freshmen, transfer, and continuing Hawaiian students to take courses as a cohort over the summer taught by amazing instructors and with enrichment programming embedded into the program itself.

Students earn credits toward graduation and as a supplement, participate in workshops that introduce them to student resources, prepare them with the necessary skills and tools for success in college, and help them build a Hawaiian identity at UH Mānoa!

Summer institute classes are offered tuition-free saving students and families \$1,900.00 per 3 credit class. Students need only pay summer school UH administrative fees of \$143/class.

The following classes (on the flyer) are now open for registration. Classes close as seats fill and seats are filled on a first-come, first-serve basis for qualified students. Priority deadline to apply for Summer Institute classes are May 24th.
