

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Na Ha'awina

This packet of 12 lessons (na ha'awina) is for learners of any age to use while watching the lessons provided on tape or via "video-streaming" technology. The viewer(s) need not take extensive notes, for all the appropriate Hawaiian words and phrases are included. All the learner need do is follow in the booklet as each lesson progresses, or use the booklet for review/practice at other times.

These video lessons were produced in 1994/1995 by Department of Education staff at their studio facilities in Honolulu, and were distributed live and direct statewide on cable TV Educational Access channels. The kumu, Ekela Kaniaupio-Crozier, was a Resource Teacher at the Kamehameha Schools Hawaiian Studies Institute at the time. A talented team of Kamehameha Schools' video professionals (Larry Loganbill, Richard Rapoza, Mike Racoma, Dave Tome, and Marsha Bolson) produced a vignette "roll-in" for each lesson.

In November, 2001, the Distance Learning Department of the Kamehameha Schools began restoring the lessons for re-distribution on VHS tapes, and for Video-Streaming over the World Wide Web. Viewers are asked to tolerate; 1) a few outdated audio segments; 2) attempts to "hide" outdated visual information; 3) the inconsistencies and weaknesses of video-streaming technologies. Beyond those shortcomings, you are likely to agree that these programs were done very well, and Ekela herself is a wonderful and skillful teacher.

We hope you find these programs helpful for learning the basics of our beautiful Hawaiian language. Our hope is that this series will stimulate further interest on your part. Or, as was for some of our kupuna cable TV viewers in the mid-nineties; it will rekindle the use of a language that was spoken during childhood years, but for some reason abandoned and neglected for years. E malama pono!

Please write to us, call us, or Email us. If there is a strong response from the world wide community of Hawaiians, and Hawaiians at heart, we will have justification for restoring the remaining 24 programs in the series.

This packet is intended for you to use while watching the video. Hopefully, it allowed you to watch, learn and enjoy, without writing everything down while going through the lessons. You will notice certain words are italicized or underlined to let you know that they're new or can be substituted for other words. Recommended references for the series are <u>Place Names of Hawai'i</u>, Puku'i, Elbert & Mo'okini, <u>The Hawaiian Dictionary</u>, Puku'i & Elbert and a new Hawaiian language textbook, 'Ölelo 'Oiwi, Hokulani Cleeland.

Our goal is to provide you with tools for conversation. Therefore, each lesson focuses on the conversations of Tütü and her three moʻopuna (grandchildren) as they participate in different activities. After previewing the vignette, the kumu will introduce the lesson, based on the patterns used. Following the lesson, we will review the new vocabulary. "Nä Minuke Haʻawina" are situations where the viewer will be tasked with using the grammar structure in a specific situation that will be displayed on the screen for 2 minutes. Then we'll review the vignette again and see how much more we understand after the explanation and some practice! "Nä Minuke Noʻonoʻo" are provided for you to practice the value being highlighted for the day.



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
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Nã Minuke Ha'awina
