101 Years of Song Contest

Mele are the receptacles of our collective ancestral memory. They are what we, as a people, have used to talk to each other across generations. Upon creation, mele transform thoughts into energy. The more a mele is spoken, sung, and danced into life, the more energy it gains. Like a stone skipping across a pool of water, a well-crafted mele has the ability to skip across space and time, connecting us to our past and our future, and creating ripple effects in each new era.



Long before the inception of a choral competition at Kamehameha Schools, the practice of perpetuating mele Hawai'i was well established. Charles E. King, a member of the first graduating class of the School for Boys in 1891, explained how the school's singing tradition began:

"Theodore Richards ... was inspired by [the] discovery of the great musical talent among us boys. Richards gave us Hawaiian songs to sing in four-part harmony; he was able to get into the hearts of his pupils, and that was the reason for his success ... He took us on concert tours around the islands, making us proud of ourselves, proud of our school, and making our Hawaiian audiences proud of our accomplishments."

In the early years of Song Contest, each class would perform two songs—the first was an original Hawaiian composition created by members of that class, and the second was a classic mele from the schools' accepted repertoire. This is a profound reality, considering the context of the times. Hawaiian language was not allowed to be spoken in our own school. And yet, within the early establishment of Song Contest, students were allowed to exercise their ancient tongues through mele, adding to the collective memory.



As both the schools and the competition evolved over time, the practice of composing new mele was discontinued and our engagement with mele shifted. We were still accessing the information held in existing texts and continuing their reverberations into the future, but we were not actively creating new energies by voicing our contemporary stories. We were not skipping any new stones across the pool. That is, not until today.

On this, the 101st Song Contest, we reflect on the past century and pause to celebrate where this beloved tradition has delivered us. What originated as an acapella singing competition in an increasingly-threatened native tongue has matured into a practice of mele and mo'olelo in our revitalized 'ōlelo makuahine. This re-engagement with our history through song has activated us and brought us to renewed understandings of our cultural identity—an identity no longer fading, but one eager to thrive in modern contexts.

One hundred and one years' worth of students have sung the songs of their kūpuna, preserving invaluable data that serves as our foundation and constant inspiration. Those mele are the pages of our history kept alive at the tip of the tongue.

Perhaps there is no better evidence of our need to reflect on the events of today as the foundation for tomorrow than this year's special circumstances. The current global health crisis has re-centered us with renewed focus. The last two years have provided sublime clarity about the value of this annual tradition. This may be a Song Contest reimaged in form, but as relevant as it has ever been.

Today, we realize that we are kūpuna for the century to come. We affirm that there are more pages to our story. And thus, we know there are more mele to be written. More stones to be skipped. In doing so, we ensure that we continue to tell our stories of today, grounded in our past and poised for our future. What mele will be sung about us 100 years from now?

THE COMPOSITION PROCESS
HAKU MELE COHORTS


Over 100 Kamehameha high school students, from freshmen to seniors, volunteered to work with revered haku mele to create ten new compositions commemorating important stories of our lāhui today.

Students participated in high-intensity training sessions over the course of one month. During these sessions, they received guided instruction in researching their subject matter and were exposed to fundamental forms and techniques of haku mele. Their studies culminated in an all-day work session to create lyrics and melodies, under the close mentorship of one or more haku mele experts.

These are some of the most recent chapters of the inter-generational saga of aloha 'āina. They are kīpuka (oases) of aloha 'āina that continue to grow across our pae 'āina. While kīpuka aloha 'āina are many, those below serve as the inspiration for our ten new mele:



Iwi Kūpuna

The bones of our ancestors make up the landscape of our 'āina, both literally and figuratively. How do we navigate a world of development while maintaining our respect for kūpuna of the past, present, and future?

'Ōlelo Hawai'i

Because of the invaluable foundation set by celebrated heroes of 'ōlelo Hawai'i, our language has survived near extinction, currently finding more contexts in which to thrive. With this foundational support, what more is in store for 'ōlelo Hawai'i beyond survival?

Kaho'olawe

The reclamation of Kaho'olawe defined a generation and awakened aloha 'āina in many. Today, work continues to restore the physical and cultural landscape – providing a template of lanakila, of victory, for future generations.

Rapid 'Ōhi'a Death

In so many ways, the 'ōhi'a lehua is a symbol of much cultural significance. What lessons can we derive from the threat of its loss, and moreso, from its rebirth?



Kalaupapa

While intended as a place of exile, Kalaupapa and Kalawao became a home for so many patients of Hansen's disease. Today, the remaining residents, their 'ohana, and the generations to follow, stand at the cusp of a new future for this storied 'āina.



Wa'a

He Wa'a, He Moku. The wa'a is an island. The sustainability of life on the wa'a, then, is the same as that on an island. What does the wa'a teach us, and how can we apply that knowledge to forge a sustainable future?

Puna Eruption

The 2018 volcanic activity on Hawai'i Island and the resulting "Fissure 8" demonstrates the reality of Pele's presence and her impact on the lives of kānaka. While she claims her 'āina, we must remember: within destruction, there is creation.

Hanalei Flooding

to all. While water diversions have
characterized generations of practice,
how do we restore and maintain true
balance today?



The mele composed and performed by students at Song Contest 2021 commemorate these kīpuka aloha 'āina, helping to capture their essence and define who we are for the next 100 years. It is our hope that each one creates ripples that are both heard and felt well into our past as well as our future. I mau ke aloha 'āina—so that aloha 'āina perseveres.

The number of wildfires and the length of the wildfire season have been increasing in recent decades releasing more harmful toxins into the atmosphere adversely affecting the world.

The seas rise and break. Kanaloa swells and rises up engulfing the earth.

Global warming is causing glacial melt around the world causing oceans to rise, islands to disappear and the destruction of coastal zones the world over. Surplus carbon dioxide in the atmosphere is absorbed by the oceans, making them acidic and difficult for corals and microorganisms that form shells to survive. These changes are disrupting the food supply for other sea animals causing oceanic ecologic collapse.

The Song Contest is unique to Kamehameha – a tradition that has involved all students in musical competition for one hundred and one years. Miss Laura Brown, Director of Music at Kamehameha from 1926-1947, stated that “the objectives of the song contest are to build up the repertoire of the best in Hawaiian music for the cultural heritage of any student who attends Kamehameha; to develop leadership, cooperation and good class spirit; and to give students the use of their singing voices and to give them pleasure in singing as a means of expression.”

The first song contest for male students was held at the School for Boys in 1921. A cup named for George Alanson Andrus, a former director of music at Kamehameha School for Boys whose life inspired the idea of an annual song contest, was offered as an incentive in the competition.

1922 marked the first year that both the Kamehameha boys and girls held song contests. Mrs. E. G. Scoville, a visitor to the Islands from Watertown, Connecticut, was so impressed with the singing of the Kamehameha girls that she donated the New England Mothers' Cup for the School for Girls competition.

In 1967, an additional trophy was offered by the Trustees in honor of Charles Edward King, an 1891 graduate of the School for Boys. The trophy is awarded to the class winning the combined class competition.

The Louise Aoe McGregor Award, named for a member of the first graduating class of the School for Girls in 1897, was first presented in 1972. It recognizes the student director who has made the most significant contribution to the class in organizational ability, leadership, assistance to others, and persistence.

The Richard Lyman, Jr. ‘Ōlelo Makuhine (Mother Language) Award recognizes excellence in the use of the Hawaiian language within a song. Mr. Lyman, a Kamehameha Schools Trustee from 1959 to 1988, was keenly interested in the preservation of Hawaiian language and culture.

The Helen Desha Beamer Award recognizes the best musical performance. Donated by the Kamehameha Alumni Association, the award honors the substantial contributions of Helen Desha Beamer to the lexicon of Hawaiian music. Helen Desha Beamer was a 1900 graduate of the Kamehameha School for Girls.

In the early years, the girls' song contest was held in front of the Assembly Hall, and the boys' was held in front of Bishop Hall. When the School for Girls campus on Kapālama Heights was completed in 1931, separate contests for boys and girls were held in the auditorium. In 1952, the first combined contest of the School for Girls and School for Boys Senior Division took place in Kekūhaupi'o, the newly constructed fieldhouse. The song contest moved to the Neal Blaisdell Center in 1964 and has been attended by capacity crowds there ever since. A highlight of the evening is the Hō‘ike, a show to entertain and inform the audience while the judges' score sheets are tallied. The Hō‘ike is an exhibition of the beauty of Hawaiian mele and hula.
