## Course Description: Grades K-5 (Lower Division)

### MAUI NŌ KA 'OI

Grade Level: Kindergarten

Course Number: MS03002 | 8:00am – 2:30pm

Monday-Friday

\$600

Maui is the best; there is no place like home! In this course, keiki explore the various geographical features of Maui. From the depths of the awāwa, to the peaks of the mauna, keiki deepen their aloha 'āina for this place they call home. Through kilo, collaboration, and 'āina engagement, we will have the opportunity to get to know our 'āina and develop a relationship with it.

### 'ĀINA ALLIANCES

Grade Level: 1

Course Number: MS03102 | 8:00am – 2:30pm

Monday-Friday

As Kanaka maoli we rely on the close relationships that surround us. The Kumulipo tells us “He nuku, he wai ka ‘ai a ka la‘au”- The Earth and water are the food of the plant. It is the interactions of plants, animals and our natural resources that we depend on for medicine and food. Essentially, these relationships keep us alive. Explore the 'āina alliances of our kūpuna and help us continue perpetuating this pilina.

### KAI KOMMOTIONS

Grade Level: 2

Course Number: MS03203 | 8:00am – 2:30pm

Keiki Marine ecologists become the field experts of this papa as we dive into the motion of the ocean.

We explore the kai by identifying the various creatures that live there, learning how the ecosystems function best, and determining how we can become better caretakers. We look to the kai as the kumu of our papa to teach us how to strengthen our relationship with these resources.

### MANU MISSIONS

Grade Level: 3

### MO'OLELO MAKERS

Grade Level: 5

## Papa Mele, Papa 'Au, Papa Paheona

K-5 Specials classes offer a unique opportunity for haumāna to dive deep into 'ike Kūpuna and nohona Hawai'i with a creative lens. Classes are scattered throughout each week. Schedules for this are TBA


**Papa Mele:** Haumāna learn new mele and hula together that they perform as a class during our Hō'ike at the end of the program. These mele set the kāhua for cultural identity, practices and perpetuation.

**Papa 'Au:** Haumāna engage in a swim class at our Olympic size pool on campus. Beginner swimmers develop a relationship with the water all while learning proper form. Intermediate and expert swimmers practice their technique and improve swimming skills. Health and safety are at the forefront of Papa 'Au. It is a wonderful way to build water confidence, teach life skills and survival for young beach goers, and to improve fitness levels.

**Papa Pāheona:** In art class haumāna use mo'olelo to create beautiful pieces. Papa Pāheona creates an opportunity for haumāna to display their own interpretations of mea Hawai'i that reflect 'āina, Kūpuna, and kānaka Hawai'i.

## Course Description: Grade 6-8 (Upper Division)



### MOANANUIĀKEA

Grade Level: 6

Course Number: MS03602 | 8:00am – 2:30pm

Monday-Friday

How deep is your aloha and sense of kuleana for the vast ocean surrounding our island home? We refer to this space as Moananuiākea, as our kūpuna did long before it was named the Pacific Ocean. Haumāna learn about their connection to Moananuiākea through the lens of the Indigenous people whose existence was sustained by traversing the ocean and depending on its daily provision.



### ‘ĀINA MOMONA

Grade level: 7

Course Number: MS03702 | 8:00am – 2:30pm

Monday-Friday

“You are what you eat”, and in this class we eat from our ‘āina. I mā’ona nō ka ‘ōpū i ke aloha o ka makua. In the same way that we look to our makua to feed us, we look to our ‘āina as the source of our nourishment. Join us as we use native and natural resources to create ‘ono and inventive meals. Practice food sovereignty, sanitation, and pule and get to know the food that grows around us. E pū pa’akai kākou me ka mahalo!



### KILOHANA NĀ KŪPUNA

Grade Level: 8

Course Number: MS03703 | 8:00am – 2:30pm

The hana and the ‘ike of our kūpuna is the foundation that we stand upon. Kilohana-excellence, is the standard that they set as they used what the ‘āina provided them to live their daily lives. Join us in learning how to use the ‘āina resources like our kūpuna did to help your ‘ohana ola.

### Course Descriptions: Grades 9-12 (Upper Division) ELECTIVE COURSES



#### PAPA NOHONA KAI (Marine Science)

Course Number: MS05006  
8:00am – 2:30pm; Monday-Friday  
\$600

- Open to all high school students
- 1 elective credit

Haumāna learn about marine ecology and culturally sustainable practices in partnership with several local marine conservation agencies. Haumāna actively participate in sea turtle rescue and rehabilitation, coral reef restoration, marine life observations, and pollution prevention projects with expert marine biologists and educators.



#### KUPU NĀ LEO (Speech)

Course Number: MS05007  
8:00am – 2:30pm; Monday-Friday  
\$600

- Open to 10-12th graders
- 1 elective credit

Our island communities need kānaka maoli leaders who can articulate their concerns and solutions regarding the issues confronting our land and ocean resources. This course focuses on generating change for our 'āina and lāhui by developing the students' public speaking skills grounded in 'ike kupuna. Haumāna are challenged to create speeches, prepare debates, and present on current community concerns.



#### PAPA LĀ'AU HAWAI'I (Hawaiian Ethnobotany)

Course Number: MS05005  
8:00am – 2:30pm; Monday-Friday  
\$600

- Open to 10th - 12th grade students.
- 1 elective credit

In collaboration with Pu'u Kukui Watershed and The Nature Conservancy, this course provides an ethnobotanical survey of native Hawaiian flora (herbs and plants), their origin, evolution, and cultural utilization, using Honolulu ahupua'a and Haleakalā as living laboratories. These significant

spaces offer haumāna a deep knowledge of the important aspects of cultural resource management of our beloved ‘āina.



### **OLA LOA NO KA LĀHUI**

Course Number: MS05009

8:00am – 2:30pm; Monday-Friday

\$600

- Open to 9th grade students
- 1 elective credit

When we know better, we do better! Our identity as kanaka maoli is steeped in the mo’olelo and hana of our kupuna, but more importantly, the lōina they’ve left for us. This course explores our na’au as Hawaiians and how we can use this information to connect to our past to be our best ‘ōiwi selves for future generations.



### **PAPA HO’OKELE WA’A I**

Course Number: MS04004

8:00am – 2:30pm; Monday-Friday

\$600

- Open to 10<sup>th</sup> – 12<sup>th</sup> grade students
- 1 elective credit

Wayfinding is an ancient art and science that our ancestors used to travel across vast oceans. This practice was restored in the 1970’s with the help of master navigator Mau Piailug and through the creation of the voyaging wa’a Hōkūle’a. Now after 40

years of sailing, Hōkūle’a and a new generation of way finders have accomplished what some have thought impossible... A sail around the world! If you are inclined to join in this 2,000 yearlong mo’okū’auhau of voyagers, join us and learn to sail Maui’s double-hull voyaging wa’a. Students are expected to swim frequently. A water skills training session and test is administered in this course before the students go on the ocean.

There are 2 scheduled coastal sails that may occur outside of normal class time, in which the students are expected to attend and provide their own transportation to earn credit for the course. KS reserves the right to modify, cancel, or otherwise adjust the overnight portion of this course based on guidance from local authorities and KS Enterprise Safety and Student Well-Being.



### **PAPA HO’OKELE WA’A II**

Course Number: MS05004

8:00am – 2:30pm; Monday-Friday

\$600

- Open to 11<sup>th</sup> – 12<sup>th</sup> grade students
- *Pre-requisite: Papa Ho’okele Wa’a I*
- 1 elective credit

This course expands on the knowledge learned in Papa Ho’okele Wa’a I.

### HE'ENALU

Course Number: MS04020

8:00am – 2:30pm; Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday  
\$300

- Open to all high school students
- *Swimming experience is mandatory.*
- 0.5 elective credit

Pi'i mai ka nalu! E he'enalu kākou! Surfing has become a world-renowned sport, but it was the sport of our ali'i before it became a sport for world champions with sponsorships. Learn the history, art and science of surfing, while improving your physical health. Whether you like sponging (bodyboarding), shortboarding or longboarding, grab your board and let's chase the waves. Students must successfully complete a swim test before participating in water-based activities.

### HUAKA'I – AI INNOVATION JOURNEY

**May 26- July 7, 2026**

Course Number: MS06060

HYBRID; Monday-Friday

\$0 - Funded through KS Digital

- Open to rising 10-12 grade students
- 1.0 elective credit

This six-week huaka'i engages haumāna in using digital media and storytelling to explore sustainability and Hawaiian culture. Through creative missions, students design projects to earn badges for milestones.

### College Dual Credit Program

The college dual credit program offers a curriculum of intensive study for highly motivated and academically qualified sophomores, juniors and seniors. These partnerships between Kamehameha Schools Maui and Arizona State University as well as the University of Hawai'i-Maui College (UHMC)

allows eligible high school students to attend college classes on the KSM campus and online. College dual credit courses provide the opportunity for high school students to earn credits toward high school graduation and a college degree. Students need to obtain approval for course credits from their home schools to ensure acceptance of credit(s) earned.

### Arizona State University Universal Learner

#### 9 Week Program

**May 26-July 18, 2026**

Students earn college credit from Arizona State University while potentially earning high school credit as well. ASU Universal Learner courses are designed to be online asynchronous, or hybrid courses dependent on instructor.

### CLS 105 COMPUTER APPLICATIONS & INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY (Closed course for ASU Cohort 1)

Course Number: MS05046

HYBRID; Monday-Friday

\$0 - Funded through KS Digital

- Open to ASU Cohort 1 haumāna only
- All students who complete course earn 3 college credits
- All KSM students who complete course earn 1 elective credit

This introductory course examines both organizations and the individuals who work within them. At the individual level, students learn how spreadsheets can improve business decision-making and help overcome cognitive biases. From the organizational perspective, the course covers strategic analysis frameworks and business strategies for competing in a digitally transformed world. Students apply spreadsheet modeling to practical personal and professional scenarios, building tools that provide new insights into problem-solving.

### CAP 194: CAREER PATHWAYS: EXPLORING YOUR FUTURE (Closed course for ASU Cohort 2)

Course Number: MS06050

HYBRID; Monday-Friday

\$0 - Funded through KS Digital

- Open to ASU Cohort 2 haumāna only
- All students who complete course earn 3 college credits
- All KSM students who complete course earn 1 elective credit

This course is designed to help you understand yourself better by assessing your personal strengths, interests, and values to uncover potential career opportunities. You gain insight into various career clusters, such as STEM, the arts, and skilled trades, while learning to set both short-term and long-term career goals that align with your aspirations.

### **HCR 210 ETHICS IN HEALTHCARE**

Course Number: MS06010

HYBRID; Monday-Friday

\$0 - Funded through KS Digital

- Open to rising 11 & 12 grade students only
- All students who complete course earn 3 college credits
- All KSM students who complete course earn 1 elective credit

This course introduces the complexity of ethical issues and challenges that face healthcare professionals in contemporary clinical practice. An overview of different philosophical positions, which serve as the theoretical foundation for the analysis of ethical conflicts, is presented. Students explore how personal, professional, & societal values affect their approach to healthcare and are reflected in the professional code of ethics.

### **HCR 220 INTRODUCTION TO HEALTHCARE**

Course Number: MS06020

HYBRID; Monday-Friday

\$0 - Funded through KS Digital

- Open to rising 11 & 12 grade students only
- All students who complete course earn 3 college credits
- All KSM students who complete course earn 1 elective credit

This course explores the historical, social, political, and economic factors that influence healthcare. You will take a critical look at why interprofessional teams are so important, how ethics factors into healthcare, and look at some of the significant historical events that have created the healthcare system we have today.

### **HCR 230 CULTURE AND HEALTH**

Course Number: MS06030

HYBRID; Monday-Friday

\$0 - Funded through KS Digital

- Open to rising 11 & 12 grade students only
- All students who complete course earn 3 college credits
- All KSM students who complete course earn 1 elective credit

In this course, you unpack some of those questions and extend them into the field of healthcare. You'll look at the U.S. as well as other countries to examine health, illness, and how healthcare is delivered. You also unpack barriers to intercultural communication and strategies to not only overcome these but to improve upon them. Cultural competency is increasingly important in not only healthcare but every single industry – come find out more about it means – and how it applies to you.

### **SOC 101: INTRODUCTORY SOCIOLOGY**

Course Number: MS06040

HYBRID; Monday-Friday

\$0 - Funded through KS Digital

- Open to rising 11 & 12 grade students only
- All students who complete course earn 3 college credits
- All KSM students who complete course earn 1 elective credit

Students learn how individuals both shape and are shaped by their communities. How individuals both actively impact and are shaped by their communities and explore the formation and persistence of societies that consist of diverse groups of people. Students gain valuable insight into the dynamics of group relationships, including how to effectively interact with others within a group. Finally, students learn how the study of sociology applies to their daily life as well as the most pressing social events of our time.

### **TRUBEL&CO: Mapping Justice: Civic Tech & Leadership for 'Ōiwi Futures**

**May 26 - July 7, 2026**

Course Number: MS06070

6 Week Program

HYBRID; Monday-Friday

\$0 - Funded through KS Digital

- Open to rising 10-12 grade students

- All students who complete course earn 3 college credits

The college credit for the Mapping Justice program by Trubel&Co is provided through the University of Massachusetts Global (UMass Global). Students who complete the program earn 3 transferable college credits under the course code SSCU 100: Mapping Justice, Designing Geospatial Tools for Social Change. These credits are offered through UMass Global's School of Extended Education.

This summer course invites haumāna to explore the intersection of technology, design, and social impact through the lens of Native Hawaiian values. In partnership with Trubel&Co, students use geospatial tools, civic data, and storytelling to investigate issues that matter to their communities—from climate resilience to cultural preservation. They are also eligible for 3 college elective credits.

Aligned with the E Ola! learner outcomes, this course supports the development of culturally grounded, academically capable, and community-focused leaders. Students engage in hands-on projects that contribute to their E Ola! Portfolio—a collection of work that showcases readiness to lead in Hawai'i and beyond.

Whether you're passionate about justice, innovation, or 'āina-based learning, this course empowers you to thrive, serve, and spark good trouble.

This course is navigated online with a few in-person sessions throughout the six weeks.

### **University of Hawai'i- Maui College 5 Week Program**

**June 16- July 18, 2026**

*Students cannot enroll in KSM early college courses unless UHMC's Early College Admissions process is completed and all necessary documentation for early admission is submitted to UHMC.*

UHMC instructions and forms pertinent to the Early College Admissions process will be available at [www.ksbe.edu/maui/summer](http://www.ksbe.edu/maui/summer) and must be completed before being considered for any early college courses.

To be eligible for the UHMC program, students must complete the Early College Admissions process which includes:

- UHMC Online Admissions Application
- Consent to Release Grades for Early Admit Student to High School form

- Early Admissions Program Application
- Completion of the Accuplacer placement test(s) with qualifying results eligible for prerequisites of specific courses

Scores for the UH Maui Accuplacer test(s) are valid for one year from the date the test is completed. Students should contact UHMC directly to decide to take the Accuplacer test(s). UHMC charges a fee when a student takes the Accuplacer test.

Once you have completed the UHMC Early College Admissions process, your application is reviewed. Upon approval, KSM works with UHMC to facilitate receipt of the student's acceptance notification.

Students are responsible for creating a UHMC username and completing UHMC's online registration for their UHMC selected course. College dual credit courses are taught by UHMC professors. Coursework is rigorous, and students are expected to meet all college course expectations and requirements. It is important to note that once enrolled in an early college course, a student may not withdraw or drop an early college credit course.

Grades earned through these courses will be reflected on the student's college transcript. Early college courses offered this summer include Composition I (ENG 100), Introduction to Psychology (PSY 100) and Hawaiian Studies (HWST107). These all qualify for dual credit for KSM students. This means that the course will count as a college and high school credit. All other students must check with their home schools if dual credit will be applicable.

These courses are taught through in-person, synchronous or asynchronous methods, at the discretion of the professor, and we reserve the right to modify, cancel, or otherwise adjust the course meeting arrangements based on guidance from local authorities and KS Enterprise Safety and Student Well-Being.

### **COMPOSITION I (ENG 100)**

Course Number: MS04007

8:00AM-12:00PM; Monday-Friday

\$600

Prerequisite: ENG 22 with grade C or better, or placement at ENG 100.
